VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

Over 50% of Canadian women will experience an occurrence of violence at some point in their lives. Violence against women is not confined to a specific culture, region, or country or to particular group of women within a society.

Abuse comes in many guises and leaves deep marks, whether physical, emotional or sexual. Abuse affects women throughout our communities, women with or without children; women in short or long term relationships and women of every age.

The Montréal Massacre; December 6, 1989, was the worst massacre in Canadian History in which 14 women at École Polytechnique lost their lives.

In 1991, December 6th was declared to be the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women in Canada.

OUR COMMITMENT

Our committee has been working on plans to erect a permanent monument to commemorate the 25th Anniversary of the Montréal Massacre. We feel that it is important to the community at large to have a permanent monument in place to go and pay our respects to those whose lives have been lost or affected by violence, a place to express our grief. It won't just memorialize the dead, but give hope to the living.

It'll be about every woman with a dream. It'll be for every woman suffering from violence. One woman will walk by this well placed stone every day. Every day, day after day, she'll walk past and gather strength. And, one day, she changes her life.

That's what the PSAC BC Victoria Regional Women's Committee and the City of Victoria will do for this woman.

A PERMANENT MONUMENT
